Carter pleads not guilty to sexual assault charges

Former Washington County School District paraprofessional Crystal Nicole Carter pled not guilty to two counts of sexual assault by person over 24 sexual battery on a victim aged 16 or 17.

During court proceedings on June 5, Carter was appointed to be represented by Public Defender Casey Bigelow by Fourteenth Judicial Circuit Chief Justice Christopher Patterson.

Carter's charges were brought by the state of Florida following a report made to the Washington County Sheriff's Office in May.

According to a report from the WCSO, on May 4, a parent reported their child had been having sex with Carter since December 2021, when the child was 17. The parent told investigators they had heard rumors and confronted their child, who admitted to having a sexual relationship with Carter twice before turning 18 and Crystal Nicole Carter continued the relationship after turning 18.

The parent advised they had looked through the child's phone and found texts and messages dating back to December 2021 with Carter, who had been working as a substitute teacher at Chipley High School. In those conversations, the child and Carter discussed the child having told other football players they were having sex.

A specific text chain dated December 9, 2021 shows Carter and the child discussing the child telling friends that he and Carter had been having sex.

State gets win in immigration fight

A federal appeals court Monday sided with Florida Attorney General Ashley Moody and kept in place rulings that blocked Biden administration immigration policies.

A panel of the 11th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals rejected a request by the Biden administration for a stay of two rulings by Pensacolabased U.S. District Judge T. Kent Wetherell, who said the policies violated federal law.

The policies, known as "Parole Plus Alternatives to Detention" and "Parole with Conditions," allowed releasing migrants into the United States amid issues such as overcrowding at detention facilities.

In a challenge filed by Moody's office, Wetherell in March rejected Parole Plus Alternatives to Detention, also dubbed "Parole+ATD." The U.S. Department of Homeland Security subsequently moved forward with the Parole with Conditions policy, but Wetherell in May issued a preliminary injunction to block it.

U.S. Department of Justice attorneys appealed to the Atlanta-based appeals court and asked for a stay ings." of Wetherell's decisions while the appeal moved forward. In part, the Justice Department argued that a stay was needed to prevent "irreparable harms" that could occur from conditions such as overcrowded detention facilities.

'The (Wetherell) orders frustrate the most effective measures available to DHS (the Department of Homeland Security) to secure the border while protecting the health and welfare of USBP (U.S. Border Patrol) agents and noncitizens during periods of increased border encounters that require immediate action by USBP to avoid overwhelming DHS capacity," the Justice Department attorneys wrote in a May 19 motion. "DHS faces an exigent situation at the southwest border.'

But in rejecting the stay request Monday, the appeals court questioned the arguments about harms, saying the Department of Homeland Security's "claims of irreparable injury ring somewhat hollow on this record, considering the department's track record of

"The department's ability to ascertain future harm is uncertain at best," said the eight-page decision, ing costs for such things as the written by Judge Barbara Lagoa and joined fully by Judge Robert Luck. "Given this record, we take DHS's latest claims of impending disaster if it is not allowed to use either of the challenged policies with some skepticism."

Judge Jill Pryor dissented in part, saying she would have granted a stay on the Parole with Conditions policy.

Lagoa and Luck are former Florida Supreme Court justices who were appointed to the appeals court by former President Donald Trump. Pryor was appointed by former President Barack Obama. Wetherell is a former state appellate judge who was appointed to the federal bench by Trump.

The 2021 lawsuit ultimately led to Wetherell's March ruling that blocked the Parole+ATD policy. Moody's office then challenged the subsequent Parole with Conditions policy.

Monday's ruling did not resolve the underlying legal issues in the appeal — it dealt only with the Biden administration's request for a stay of Wetherell's rulings.

But in a May 24 court document, Moody's office said the dispute is about an "attempt to transform parole from a narrow safety valve into a primary processing mechanism for mass-releasing aliens into this country.'

Appeals court urged to reverse education ruling

Arguing that the measure has violated speech rights and led to discrimination, attorneys for students, parents and teachers are urging a federal appeals court to revive a challenge to a 2022 Florida law that restricts instruction about gender identity and sexual orientation in schools.

The attorneys filed an 80-page brief last week at the 11th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals, contending that U.S. District Judge Allen Winsor erred when he dismissed the challenge to what Republican legislators called the "Parental Rights in Education" law — and opponents labeled the "don't say gay" bill.

Winsor ruled in February that the plaintiffs had not "alleged sufficient facts" to show they had legal standing to challenge the law (HB 1557).

"Plaintiffs have shown a strident disagreement with the new law, and they have alleged facts to show its very existence causes them deep hurt and disappointment," the Tallahassee-based Winsor wrote. "But to invoke a federal court's

"Simply put, the LGBT individual plaintiffs have personally experienced unequal and lesser treatment at the hands of teachers and officials who now restrict what they can say, read, hear, and wear," the brief said. "That constitutes injury."

The Republican-controlled Legislature and Gov. Ron DeSantis went further this year by approving a bill to broaden the prohibition on instruction about gender identity and sexual orientation to pre-kindergarten through eighth grade.

As another example of the effects of the law, the brief said a Manatee County high-school student and plaintiff, identified by the initials M.A., "abandoned a proposal he had submitted to his school prior to the enactment of HB 1557 that would have created a committee to help teachers respond to common problems for LGBT students.'

As the case plays out at the appeals court, a separate constitutional challenge to the law is pending in federal court in Orlando. U.S. District Judge Wendy Berger on Oct. 20 dismissed that case but, like Winsor, gave the plaintiffs an opportunity to file a revised version.

Insanity argued to try to prevent execution

A day after the Florida Supreme Court refused to issue a stay of the planned execution of Duane Owen, defense attorneys Tuesday filed a brief that said he should not be put to death because of insanity. The brief was part of a flurry of efforts by Owen's attorneys to prevent a June 15 execution for the 1984 murder of a Palm Beach County woman. Carter said "A football player said you are telling people something happened. I hope you let people know it's merely a joke that could cost my job."

In the same text conversation Carter says,"Anyway, I trust you with discretion and to assure that vou let your friends know nothing happened and make sure you can trust your friends know nothing happened, and make sure you can trust your friends as well. Gossip could get me under investigation by the school even if it is not true, they can pull calls and texts."

Eleven pages of screenshots were taken into evidence of conversations with Carter, but all were dated after the child turned 18, with earlier conversations hav-


ing been deleted.

Investigators obtained a sworn taped statement from the child on May 8, where they admitted that Carter had begun texting them around the beginning of their senior year of high school, asking to "hook-up."

According to a taped statement from the child, Carter and he arranged to meet at her home where they had sex. He further stated they had sex with Carter twice before he turned 18 and that they had continued seeing each other in a sexual manner since he had turned 18.

A pre-trial hearing for Carter has been scheduled for August 21 at 9 a.m.

portant development" in AI — a technology that's known as generative AI. Generative AI has exploded into the tech world in recent months and drawn widespread attention for its ability to generate things such as text and images.

"This is an important new technology. It will totally disrupt higher education," Glover told the trustees.

The provost pointed to what he called an "emerging research agenda" in generative AI.

"As everyone knows, generative AI hallucinates. ChatGPT makes mistakes, it doesn't give the right answers. It is subject to flights of fancy and depression," Glover said, referencing a widely used generative-AI tool.

OpenAI, the artificial intelligence research company that developed ChatGPT, describes its text models as "advanced language processing tools that can generate, classify, and

summarize text with high levels of coherence and accuracy.

Human efforts are needed to safeguard against ChatGPT's raw capa-

bilities, Glover said. "And so, it needs a validation ecosystem, which people are working on now. It needs development and collaboration with subject-matter experts. It needs ethics, security and policy built around it," he added.

Meanwhile, UF continues to pump significant resources into its AI initiatives. During a March 16 trustees meeting, Glover described efforts by the school as "building an AI University and infusing AI into everything that UF is doing.

The school also has proposed a new degree, the Master of Science in Artificial Intelligence Systems, which would be established within the Herbert Wertheim College of Engineering.

Florida Gulf Coast University's Board of Trustees is also eyeing the issue. The board next week will hold a discussion on artificial intelligence and its "threats and opportunities to Student's office will begin tagging

teaching and learning."

Trustees are scheduled to hear a presentation on technology tools such as ChatGPT during a board meeting Tuesday. A discussion about students' use of generative AI, particularly in assignments that involve writing, is part of the meeting's agenda.

'Following Spring Semester, 2023, FGCU saw no increase in cases of student misconduct overall or cases of Academic Integrity specifically compared to the previous year. However, anecdotal evidence from instructions of English Composition suggests that students are using ChatGPT specifically in writing assignments," a description of the planned discussion said.

The university has a license to use the plagiarism-detection software TurnItIn.com, which the school said includes an application to detect "signatures of AI-generated prose." Professors currently are using it to screen students' work.

"Moving forward, the Dean of

academic misconduct cases for instances of Generative AI usage, and an explicit syllabus statement will be generated for faculty use to prevent cases of unauthorized assistance,' Tuesday's agenda item said.

FGCU professors have been using generative AI "with excellent results," according to the meeting item.

'On the positive side, Generative AI, whether used for writing, art, graphics or other applications is likely to be a transformative innovation in higher education," the agenda said.

Glover also predicted that generative AI could reshape the internet as the technology's use becomes more widespread.

"There is going to be so much content generated on these generative AIs, that it will flood the web, and it will become unreliable and untrustworthy. You'll have some generated by people on the right, some generated by people on the left. Some promoting vaccines, some by anti-vaxxers. And so, people will lose confidence in it," he said.

100 years ago this month: Historical events from June 1923

The month of June has been home to many historical events over the years. Here's a look at some that helped to shape the world in June

- The Polo Grounds in New York City hosts a boxing match between Frenchman Eugène Criqui and Johnny Kilbane on June 2. Among those in attendance to see Criqui knock out Kilbane in the sixth round was New York Yankees slugger Babe Ruth, who arrived after a game at Yankee Stadium earlier in the day.
- On June 4, 16 men begin what becomes a 2,000-mile voyage in a single lifeboat after they are forced to abandon the British cargo ship Trevessa as it begins to founder in the Indian Ocean.
- The Soviet Army defeats what is left of the White Army near Okhotsk on June 6, ending what proves to be the last major battle of the Russian Civil War.
- On June 8, a bill is passed in the British House of Commons granting women the right to divorce their husbands on the grounds of infidelity without having to prove cruelty or desertion.
- Bulgarian Prime Minister Aleksandar Stamboliyski is toppled in a bloodless coup orchestrated by a private organization of reserve officers on June 9. Though Stamboliyski survived the coup long enough to flee to his home village of Slavovitsa, he is ultimately killed on June 14 by members of the Internal Macedonian Revolutionary Organization, a group that had attempted to assassinate him four months earlier.
- Legendary actor Lon Chaney gets the girl in "The Shock," an American silent film released on June 10. Though Chaney often played characters who did not get the girl, "The Shock" ends with Chaney's character, gangster Wilse Dilling, beginning a new life with Gertrude, whose freedom is assured thanks to a timely earthquake.
- On June 12, magician Horace Goldin is granted a patent for the popular illusion of sawing a woman in half.

The department will release a final report for the 2022-2023 season in July.

Hurricane Ian caused heavy damage to the industry after it made landfall in September in Southwest Florida and crossed the state, including barreling through major citrusgrowing areas. But even before the hurricanes, the 2022-2023 harvest was expected to be smaller than in previous years, as an initial "fruit per tree" count was down.

"It was a short crop to





The average price of a gallon of regular unleaded in Florida on Monday was \$3.47, up from \$3.36 a week earlier, according Lucie areas have the state's highest to the AAA auto club. The national average price was \$3.59 a gallon. "Summer hasn't officially begun, but the driving season is off to a roaring start," AAA spokesman Mark Jenkins said in a prepared statement. "Gasoline demand figures from the past few weeks have been stronger than what we saw during this same time last year. BLT Salad With Toasted French Bread Croutons

Ingredients:

For the croutons

1/2 loaf day old, crusty French bread, sliced in half through the center olive oil

garlic powder

For the salad

bag of pre-washed mixed greens (lettuce, spinach, baby kale etc... if fresh from the garden, even better)

tomatoes (chopped if large, or sliced in half if grape or cherry tomatoes)

5 slices bacon, pan fried, drained on paper towels, and crumbled

4 ounces white cheese, cubed or shredded, such as fresh mozzarella, provolone, Swiss, smoked Gouda, or chevre

Ranch dressing (preferably made with Ranch seasoning packet, Dukes mayonnaise, and milk)

Method:

- 1. Spread each half of French bread loaf on the cut side with olive oil. Sprinkle with garlic powder. Toast in small toaster oven until crisp, but don't allow to get dark. Alternatively, grill the oiled and seasoned bread on a grill pan on stovetop, or over embers on grill. When cool, cut into 1-inch cubes with a serrated knife.
- 2. Combine greens and tomatoes; toss. drizzle with the dressing and toss well again.
- 3. Sprinkle salad with bacon pieces, cheese, and toasted croutons, as well as salt and pepper, if desired.

We are committed to ensuring the quality of your water. The City of Bonifay routinely monitors for contaminants in your drinking water according to Federal and State laws, rules, and regulations. Except where indicated otherwise, this report is based on the results of our monitoring for the period of January 1 to December 31, 2022. Data obtained before January 1, 2022, and presented in this report are from the most recent testing done in accordance with the laws, rules, and regulations.

Drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that the water poses a health risk. More information about contaminants and potential health effects can be obtained by calling the Environmental Protection Agency's Safe

If present, elevated levels of lead can cause serious health problems, especially for pregnant women and young children. Lead in drinking water is primarily from materials and components associated with service lines and home plumbing. The City of Bonifay is responsible for providing high quality drinking water, but cannot control the variety of materials used in plumbing components. Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. These people should seek advice about drinking water from their health care providers. In 2022 the Department of Environmental Protection performed a Source Water Assessment on our system. The assessment was conducted to provide information about any potential sources of contamination in the vicinity of our wells. There are 5 potential sources of contamination identified for this system with low to moderate susceptibility levels. In the table below, you may find unfamiliar terms and abbreviations. To help you better understand these terms we've provided the following definitions:

Maximum Contaminant Level or MCL: The highest level of a contaminant that is allowed in drinking water. MCLs are set as close to the MCLGs as feasible using the best available treatment technology

Maximum Contaminant Level Goal or MCLG: The level of a contaminant in drinking water below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MCLGs allow for a margin of

Action Level (AL): The concentration of a contaminant that, if exceeded, triggers treatment or other requirements that a water system must follow.

"ND" means not detected and indicates that the substance was not found by laboratory analysis.

Parts per million (ppm) or Milligrams per liter (mg/l) - one part by weight of analyte to 1 million parts by weight of the water sample. Parts per billion (ppb) or Micrograms per liter (µg/l) – one part by weight of analyte to 1 billion parts by weight of the water sample.

Picocurie per liter (pCi/L) - measure of the radioactivity in water.

Maximum residual disinfectant level or MRDL - The highest level of a disinfectant allowed in drinking water. There is convincing evidence that addition of a disinfectant is necessary for control of microbial contaminants.

Maximum residual disinfection level goal or MRDLG - The level of a drinking water disinfectant below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MRDLGs do not reflect

The sources of drinking water (both tap water and bottled water) include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs, and wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity.

Contaminants that may be present in source water include:

- (A) Microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, which may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations, and wildlife. (B) Inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, which can be naturally-occurring or result from urban stormwater runoff, industrial or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and
- gas production, mining, or farming.
- (C) Pesticides and herbicides, which may come from a variety of sources such as agriculture, urban stormwater runoff, and residential uses.
- (D) Organic chemical contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, which are by-products of industrial processes and petroleum production, and can, also, come

from gas stations, urban stormwater runoff, and septic systems. (E) Radioactive contaminants, which can be naturally occurring or be the result of oil and gas production and mining activities.

In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, the EPA prescribes regulations, which limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. The Food and Drug Administration (FDA) regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottled water, which must provide the same protection for public health.
